

Fellow NAME Member,

NAME is in trouble and needs your help! We are writing to inform our members of a very serious issue. So serious that the entire Board felt it was imperative that this message be delivered to you so everyone is aware of the current status of our organization.

It is no secret that for many years, NAME's membership has been in decline. Although we once had over 12,000 members, we are now down to just over 4,000. For more than 20 years we have been losing a minimum of 250 members yearly; equal to nearly \$175,000 in dues alone. Add to this the fact that expenses are rising steadily while donations continue to drop.

At our last Finance Committee meeting our Treasurer, Stan Boyd, reported that given our current financial status, with no Houseparties scheduled in Fall, 2015 or Spring, 2016, we may only be able to survive for nine months, possibly a year. After that we will not be able to meet our financial obligations and NAME may have to close our doors forever! It costs us about \$20K a month just to meet expenses and with little projected income this is a very real possibility.

Our Expenses are: 1/3rd for the *Gazette*, 1/3rd for the cost of maintaining an office, (utilities, insurance, staff, equipment, postage, etc) and 1/3rd for all other expenses. (NAME merchandise, Pins, Legal and accounting, fundraisers, etc.)

So how did we get in this position? In order to meet our expenses, we have depended on one Convention and at least two Houseparties each year for many years. We have had Houseparties that ended up with no profit and in a few cases we ended up paying penalties because we did not meet our contractual obligations. A recent costly issue occurred when we had no Housparty in the Fall, 2013 or Spring, 2014. That will happen again this next fiscal year. We improvised with a *Gazette* Houseparty and a Houseparty Online. The Online Houseparty was a great idea, but netted only a \$4000 profit. The Houseparty in the *Gazette* actually ended up costing us due to the increased cost of publication.

We realize that the cost of attending the NAME Conventions and Houseparties is increasing to the point where some members are choosing not to attend every event. The result is lower registrations and lower revenues.

NAME derives its income from four sources: Membership fees, Events, Fundraisers and Donations.

- **Membership:** has been in a steady decline of approximately 250 per annum since 1984 Result is reduced income.
- **Events:** The cost for our members to attend the events has increased to the point where the attendance is lower. The venues are becoming increasingly more expensive to use. Our Houseparties and Conventions are meant to be self-supporting with a little bit going to help cover our overhead. Declining attendance has impacted the income we depend on.

• **Fundraisers:** We have opened up our NAME auction pages to include non NAME members to help increase the income. The Phantom Ball last year netted us a good income (after expenses) and other fundraisers have been planned for the rest of this year to help support NAME. The ticket drawings in the *Gazette* have gone way down. We only sold 412 tickets so far this year.

• **Contributions:** After the Fun Club Donation Drive ended we did not replace it with another Fund Drive. Non-Profit Organizations depend on donations to survive.

Our cash accounts are not sufficient to meet our obligations for more than the next few months.

This is a situation that has been building for years and every Board has faced many of the same issues, and now the urgency of this situation requires immediate attention. We need your help to keep NAME solvent.

Beginning today we are establishing a “For the Love of NAME” Fund Drive. Think of all the reasons you love NAME, think of all the people that are in your world because of NAME, think of all the help and support you have gotten from NAME members, think of all the roundtables you have ordered from NAME artisans, think of all the lessons you have learned from our NAME instructors, think of all the shows that have been there for you to participate in, think of all the special projects you have had access to because of the *Gazette* and while NAME is not what it once was it is still the Best Little Organization in the world and is worth saving and making every effort to restore it to its former self. If you love NAME and want it to continue to help you and other miniaturists join us in our “For the Love of NAME” Fund Drive .

If every member could find it in their heart to support us with a \$5.00 donation, that would raise nearly \$20,000! Think what a larger donation can do! Send your donation of any amount to NAME now.





NAME Day 2015 Window Shopping October 3, 2015

My favorite Christmas movie is the original version of "Miracle on 34th St" with Maureen O'Hara, Edmund Gwenn, John Payne, and Natalie Wood. In this movie, Edmund Gwenn, as Santa Claus, tells the child Natalie Wood about different nations of the world, and emphasizes the *Imagi*-nation, to encourage the girl to expand her world.

Miniatures are like that...they are our ticket to the *Imagi*-Nation.

We take a workshop. Maybe there are 15 people in this workshop. We are

provided materials, instructions, assistance. We all begin with the same pieces to construct, the same glues, maybe the same wallpaper or paint. If we keep to the plan, we all end up with identical results.

But the nations of the world aren't identical. There are different cultures, different customs, different geographic make-ups, different economies. The *Imagi*-nations have nearly the same thing—a variety of differences which make them independent of each other.

Each of us has our own *Imagi*-nation. Each of us brings to our own *Imagi*-nation ideas independent of one another. This in turn brings different results, different looks, different shapes and sizes, to the project we work on!

We stretch our boundaries. We journey to our own *Imagi*-nations. We tweak a piece differently here, paint a piece differently there. As we do so, we establish our own *Imagi*-Nations.

They never take the same shape. The boundaries of our *Imagi*-Nations shift and expand infinitely, like the sand of desert dunes. Our ideas blow this way and that, never settling in.

This is the beauty of the NAME Day project this year, planned for October 4: Window Shopping. Already we see how individuals have journeyed into their *Imagi*-Nations and are creating

Meet the Artisan Couple - Shawn and Robin Betterley

When did you first become interested in Miniatures?

I became interested in miniatures while working at one of my first "real" jobs. My boss' daughters had a doll house full of wonderful fine scale miniatures. The boss' wife would bring me catalogs from some of the companies and artisans of the time - early 1970's. My heroine's were Bettyanne Twigg (Elspeth) and Susan Sirkis with her Wish Booklets. I loved and admired their work. Shawn didn't have much interest in miniatures at this time.

It's interesting to look back and realize that I was already making miniatures, something I did with my dad. I called it doll house furniture. It was thick wood furniture made for play. He built them and I painted them.

My dad and I did craft shows with wood items he built and I grew flowers which I dried and sold in arrangements. One time, when getting ready for a craft fair, he showed me some furniture that he'd built as Christmas presents for the grandchildren, there were about 10 girls then, all in the right age group. He'd wondered if I could paint them so they'd look cute. I did and they were so cute we took some to the show. They sold better than any of our other items. We were hooked with making small furniture, but I wouldn't have known at that time to call them "miniatures".

One day my mom suggested that I make something to put on the tables, like food or flowers. I discovered that bottle caps made impressive pie pans, yes I truly did! I learned how to make bread dough fruits and vegetables. I

made quilts and Christmas trees, all from stuff I could find or get my hands on. It was at that time that I discovered MINIATURES with the help of my boss' wife! Oh my goodness, what a wonderful world it was. Shawn still wasn't terribly excited, although he did spend what seemed like a boatload of money on a truly fine handmade settle bench which he gave me on our second Christmas together.

When and how did your spouse become interested in miniatures?

Sometime in the next couple of years, we were invited to sell at a real miniatures show. I still had the "play" furniture that Dad and I made together, but my line had developed due to a friendship that sparked between another couple and ourselves. She and I became lifelong friends. That's what happens in this miniature world of ours. Anyway... at our first miniature show I met Pat Bauder who took me under her wing and helped guide the way for us to really become miniaturists. Shawn believed it was a nice hobby with some side benefits.

What inspired you to start a miniature business?

At some point in the next few years he realized it could be more than a hobby and with much consideration, we moved from Maine to New Hampshire and opened a miniature shop. Shawn wanted to own his own business, be a shop owner, and miniatures seemed to be the most likely venue at that time.

What jobs are each of you more inclined to do when it comes to the business responsibilities?

Although we moved several times as we grew, our miniature shop called *The Tiny Touch* became our main employment, with Shawn as the business department and myself in the creative department. One major thing we learned is that if a business is to be successful, there is no time in the daily day for creating and working on new ideas. I think we juggled this concept a lot, trying out different approaches. The

best solution for us was to hire a few people. Shawn continued in the shop and I worked a day or two in the shop and spent the rest of the time fine tuning my miniature offerings and producing enough stock to also sell wholesale at the CIMTA shows - Cottage Industry Miniature Trade Shows.

At shows, Shawn's job is to lug the stuff in and then lug it back out. Once in the show venue, he stands back while I fuss with everything, twice over. Then he sets up lights and register.

During the early time we had two children, both girls, who traveled the country with us when we had shows. It was great fun. As they got older and more involved with school, sports, boys, ballet, and all the other activities that go with being teenagers, we sat back a bit from the travel. Our focus turned to growing the shop which became more active with classes and workshops.

Have your children gotten involved with your miniature business?

The girls were always adamant that they would not be interested in our kind of a business. They still tell a story about child labor abuse when they were "forced" to add little bits of greenery to wreaths, or to put little things in bags and staple them shut.

I remember them being happy to get some quick spending money. Both pursued a different degree in the arts and went off and did the marrying, children etc. kind of thing. But guess what? We caught one, yup, we did, lured her away from another business where she was top dog and she's our new bright star at Robin Betterley's Miniatures. Taryn brings computer skills, internet knowledge, business sense, and her own artistic talents and humor to our miniature business. Her husband Scott is also "hooked" and will be becoming more and more involved as we go forward. They are our business's future. The other daughter did OK too, she pursued double majors and is in her fifth year of teaching art to high school teenagers. She is confident that "she will not come on board" and "will not become a miniaturist". We'll see...

What tools and special equipment do you use to manufacture your items for sale?

Our respective jobs and tools are very defined. Shawn designs and cuts the furniture and accessory kits from drawings and photos that Taryn and I send to him. Usually with just a few revisions we are all seeing eye to eye. After the kit is test built and a good prototype made we give him the all clear to begin cutting. He works with computers and laser. New to his workshop is a 3D printer which is humming with prototypes and a few pieces that will go into production.

I am generally the one with inspiration, tempered by Taryn's reality and Shawn's workload. If we're being honest, I am always more interested in the next project than the one on my table. My work ethic demands that I will finish what I start, so the work gets done, the project gets kitted and it goes into production. The next project is the carrot dangled in front of my nose to keep the production moving forward.

Taryn is the business manager, a job that was always Shawn's but which he's happily relinquished. She focuses on that part of the job early in the day so that she can spend some time doing design as well.

What is your favorite scale in miniature and why?

Our favorite scales, hmmm...I think mine would be 2" = 1'. This is a scale I enjoy for decorating but not one that we can always work into our kits, although there have been a few. I also love 1/2", as it's cute enough to be cute, but detailed enough to be detailed. Wait, I think I also really love 1/4", oh and also micro scale. Well, I can't leave out 1" as that's how I got started, I love it too. I think Shawn would say he likes all of them as well. Taryn loves micro scale, the smaller the better.

What is the hardest part of running a miniature business.

There's nothing hard about having a miniatures business. Work is work, business is business and they all have inherent attributes. You have good days, you have bad days. You have days when everyone loves you and loves your work, you have days when you mess up, leave out parts, ship the wrong item, or just can't make a customer happy.

I guess the hardest thing about having a miniature business is sometimes making a deadline. There are always lots of deadlines.

The easiest?

We love what we do and that makes going to work a pleasure.

Your favorite?

I think we all would agree that the folks involved in the miniatures industry are some of the best in the world. We love to have fun, to share ideas, to travel, take workshops, collect little things, be creative, eat great food, and embrace this very special hobby.

Someday, you will want to "Hang it up" as they say. What will you do with your miniatures and why?

Taryn and Scott will continue on with the business when we are ready to play something different. We picture them taking us out to a show now and then so we can smile and say hello to people. They can prop us up somewhere.

Our eclectic collection will follow with the business as inspiration.

What will you do with your extra time?

Seriously? Extra time? I don't even begin to know what that is so it would be very hard to answer. I guess we would spend more time at our camp down east, more traveling, more painting, more gardening, more knitting, hooking, crocheting, sewing, hmmm...

If you met someone who was just getting interested in a miniature business, what words of wisdom would you share with them?

If someone asked me what I would share with them about a miniatures business I would tell them to figure out what people want and then give it to them. Well, not give it to them, but you know what I mean. If something isn't selling it isn't because the show is bad or that the internet is taking over. Look at your skills and see how you can make something wonderful from them.

You have generously donated time and products to NAME and it's programs. Why?

Shawn and I have supported NAME since 1979 when we first became members. Our memberships lapsed a bit in the "teenager" years but we came around again. We've supported NAME because it's been our support as well. We believe if you belong to a group, you need to give back to the group in the ways that you best can. Sometimes that is with your time, and sometimes it's with sharing your gifts. I think we all try to do what we can.

If you could have one wish regarding miniatures... what would it be?

That we all continue to enjoy and create (I'm doing a run-on sentence so I can get it all in), that we share our skills and time, that we take opportunities to allow younger people to experience this hobby, that we are nice to each other and that we respect each other's differences.

Thank you Robin for SHARING your insights with us today. It sounds like Robin Betterley's Miniatures is definitely a Family Run Business and planning on being around for a long time.

If you are new to NAME you probably haven't had time to ponder all the fun and exciting world of NAME. In fact you are probably still at the "fascinated by it all" stage.

If you have just discovered that you are not the only person interested in dollhouse miniatures and that there are a bunch of people (guys and gals) who are willing to talk to you and share their experiences in miniatures.....well, you are not alone at all.

Most of us at NAME went through that same feeling at one time or another. We would almost give up chocolate to share time with another miniaturist. And to sit down with a bunch of miniaturists and work on a project....(yes, you guessed it) ...it was pure heaven!

Fortunately, in 1972 a few miniaturists got together and came up with the idea of forming a non-profit organization to band together all us like-minded miniaturists so we had a better source of information about dollhouse miniatures. That organization was called "National Association of Miniature Enthusiasts

(NAME). A while later the organization found a wonderful old house that soon housed our office and our museum in Carmel, Indiana. One of the goals of NAME is to continue to preserve the craft and collections of dollhouse miniatures. A museum of miniatures is the best way to achieve that goal.

Except for the personnel in the office, NAME is an all-volunteer organization. There are over 100 volunteer men and women helping keep miniatures and NAME healthy so it will be there for future generations.

A Board of Trustees governs NAME. All 12 of the Trustees are seasoned veterans of NAME and work hard to keep the organization up to date and solvent. NAME is divided into 14 regions including Canada and other International Countries. Each region has a Regional Coordinator and State or Province Representatives that keep the lines of communications flowing.

Every year NAME has a convention that is held in July. It is held in different places in the United States so that

members from different areas have an opportunity to participate without traveling too far. During the Spring and Fall NAME often has a minor version of the convention. It is called a House-party. It only lasts a few days but it is so much fun creating miniatures, meeting and making friends and just plain old refreshing and renewing together.

Many of the clubs also have functions called State Days where everyone gets together and works on one specific project. There are usually prizes and food and fun at those parties too!

NAME Day is celebrated each October in conjunction with Dollhouse Miniature Month. All of our NAME members work on the same project worldwide on one specific weekend. Clubs and individuals band together to share miniatures and fellowship.

Every year NAME has a special project called the HALLMARK® contest where members use HALLMARK® ornaments to create a scene.

So you see, we are a busy group and are very pleased you decided to join us.

On the Patio - A 1/12th Inch Scale Glass Dome Vignette

The real calendar may say it's winter, but in the world of miniatures it can be whatever season you want such as summertime with flowers in bloom and lemonade and cookies on the patio!

In this vignette, the cupcake holder that originally inspired the contest's table and chairs was repurposed as a rug where it continues to provide the primary color palate and floral motif.

Obviously, the focal point of the scene is the settee which was created by turning the two contest chairs to face each other and giving them a joining seat and upholstered back. I created a cross-stitch pattern that closely resembles the floral motif of the cupcake holder/contest table topper and then stitched it directly onto salvageable sections of the contest table skirt to make the settee's upholstered back and the ruffled throw pillow. The bench seat pillow and one of the throw pillows were tufted with 1/16th inch yellow buttons that I made from clay. These buttons are actually sewn on through their two tiny holes! A green checked fabric was chosen for this bench seat and throw pillow (as well as the backside of the settee's upholstered back) to echo the green checked background found in the center of the cupcake holder. Other coordinating fabrics were used to make the additional throw pillows one of which is in the shape of a cat that has a flower medallion (made from clay) hanging from its collar. The card-stock base of the contest table was repurposed as an occasional table by painting it red and covering it with a

fabric ribbon that gives it a rattan-like look. A tiny floral motif was cross-stitched directly onto the napkins made from an antique linen handkerchief. The same handkerchief material was used in creating the ruffle on the cross-stitched throw pillow. The little paper cookies were coffee-stained and "iced" while the plate, lemonade set, and plants were purchased items. Of course the needle crafter in me says that a miniature settee is "never fully dressed" without an afghan. Consequently, I used a size 16 crochet hook and white Sulky thread to crochet a miniature afghan with a lovely floral motif in its pattern.

To help facilitate the photography, the pictures were taken without the glass dome. When the dome is in place, the two baskets of red geraniums hang from wall brackets over either end of the couch. These brackets were made from corners of a wooden laser-cut picture frame purchased at a local craft store. I wish to thank my husband, Lynn Swisher for his help in making these brackets, and my son-in-law, Dr. Ryan Mayes for his photography skills.





MATERIALS NEEDED:

- #40 or #48 Silk Gauze
2-1/2" x 2-1/2"
- #10 Crewel Needle
- DMC Embroidery Floss
924 Dark Blue
926 Medium Blue
927 Light Blue
355 Dark Red
520 Dark Green
3031 Brown
680 Dark Gold
729 Medium Gold
822 Off White (Background)
- Backing Fabric
- Stuffing for Pillow

STITCH COUNT:

37 (wide) x 37 (high)

PREPARATION OF GAUZE:


1. Mark top of gauze - it is important that selvedges are at the sides.
2. Tape your gauze very tightly to a cardboard frame with a 2" x 2" opening.
2. Using one (1) strand of floss (8"- 10" in length) start design in the center.
3. Begin background leaving a three (for #40) or four (for #48) stitch border from the edge of the worked pattern.



STITCHING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. The coded stitches should be worked in the continental stitch. The uncoded stitches (background) may be worked in the basket weave stitch.

2. Remove finished work from frame and steam iron. Let dry completely.

3. Begin background leaving a three (for #40) or four (for #48) stitch border from the edge of the worked pattern.

FINISHING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Cut around edge of worked area, leaving 1/4" border of unworked gauze. Cut backing fabric the same size.
2. Crease gauze to the edge of the stitching. Miter corners if desired, but not to the edge of the stitching. Steam iron. Crease backing fabric to match. Steam iron.
3. Whip-stitch around three sides using the holes in the gauze as a guide. Fill with pillow stuffing. Whip-stitch opening.
4. Whip-stitch around three sides using the holes in the gauze as a guide. Fill with pillow stuffing. Whip-stitch opening.


CONTINENTAL STITCH

Done horizontally, starting at the upper right, work each row of stitches from right to left.

Bring the needle back up at 3 and down at 4.

Continue stitching.

At the end of each row, finish the last stitch, leaving the needle at the back of the canvas.





BASKETWEAVE STITCH

This stitch is worked diagonally, and gets its name by the pattern formed on the reverse side of the canvas as the stitch is worked.

To work a row of basketweave stitch, bring your needle up in the bottom left hole of the target intersection (1), and insert your needle down into the canvas in the upper right hole of the target intersection (2). Bring your needle up in the next hole to the diagonal upper left. Repeat the process working upwards diagonally to work a row.

The next row of stitches is worked in the opposite direction - to the diagonal lower right.




Back wall, refrigerated case for cut flowers behind the sales counter.

AT LAST! Owen's dream became reality! His Museum of Miniatures was now open for business!



And, on the same trip, they found this delightful little cottage in Ireland!







If visitors wanted to shop for their own treasures, he stocked a few simple things ... a toy box dollhouse was for sale ...




... and some dollhouse kits for those who wanted to build their own memories. ("kits" made by Claudia Heckart)

• It's All in the Details •

I don't buy very many kits, if I do I usually love it exactly as it, so I don't do a lot of kit bashing. If I do it's usually just some intense aging, or perhaps in a house switching stairs from one side to another. For this article I actually did a small table from a very cheap kit, and then used a Dremel to round



the edges, creating a more turned leg, and used wood filler to fill the shoddy tab and slot construction. I took step by step photos, I started to type the article, but honestly, I just don't love the table. If anyone desperately wants the photos to see what I did get in touch, and I'll gladly share them. And since I work on a small craft schedule, and am a serious procrastinator, I don't have time for a new project. Instead I'm going to include the photo of the finished table and give you a list of ideas of how you can modify kits to various degrees. Hopefully this will help other newbies, and refresh the memories of the more experienced.

Some Kit Modifying Ideas

- For a simple house fill in the stairway hole with a scrap of wood, and cut a new staircase somewhere else.
- Do a house kit backwards! You can sometimes completely reverse the floor plan. Before you do it for good, try just doing a taped version to see how it all fits. And unless you're very brave don't do it on a terribly expensive kit.
- Use a Dremel tool or small files to add curves, turned legs, or scalloped edges.
- Saw off the legs and use pre-turned elements instead.
- Replace a table top with a new table top of a fancier wood.
- Bust apart cheap furniture to marble the top, repaint it, or reupholster it.
- Cheap furniture with a weird gloss, or red stain can be busted apart and then sanded to create a much more realistic color.
- Many store bought pieces can be softened and disassembled by microwaving for a few seconds at a time until the glue softens. Some can be simply cut or popped apart with a craft knife.
- Pop off chair seats and then redo them with caning.
- If a tab and slot item has gaping holes, fill them in with wood filler or spackle. I especially like the wood filler for wooden floors. It's a bit more liquid than others to really fill the hollows and creates a very smooth surface. It may however, take more than one coat.
- Don't be afraid to experiment!
- If you have a dining room table you can chop the legs lower and make it a coffee table. Or you can add new legs or extensions and make it bar height!
- You can use your craft knife or fancy tools to add in cut-work designs, scrolling, or fancy edges.
- You can take the top of one cabinet, armoire, or hutch, and combine it with the bottom of a different one.
- Use Sculpey or Fimo to add designs. Ball feet, claw feet, designs that pop out, drawer pulls, doorknobs, the ideas are endless.

I don't want to fill pages with ideas, but hopefully this can get your brain in gear and give you some ideas for the next time you're in your work room. Stay tuned for next time! Alicia



A resin doll from the dollar store can easily be changed to enhance a scene using a Dremel tool and a little imagination.

1. Saw off the base if too tall.
2. Remove any decor that does not work.
3. Saw off arms and drill holes in arm and shoulder.
4. Glue and insert short pipe cleaners into arms and shoulders making movable arms. The hands will not be pretty but can always be camouflaged by holding something.
5. Dress and wig the doll to your liking.

2015 NAME Day Guidelines



NAME Day 2015 Window Shopping October 3, 2015

The purpose of NAME Day is to unite and involve all NAME members by doing the same project on the same day at different locations throughout the US and internationally. Participation in an event may occur in clubs, locally, statewide, regionally, or online. Information will be in the NAME Miniature Gazette to encourage all NAME members' participation.

• Dates •

As a way to kick off International Dollhouse and Miniatures Month, NAME Day will be on Saturday, October 3, 2015. Expanded events (or areas with conflicting dates) should occur as close to this date as is reasonably possible.

• Project •

All events will center on the same project – "Window Shopping". Plans for the Window will be provided in 1", 1/2" and 1/4" scale. Some cutters will produce kits for 1/144" scale.

1. This event is for NAME members and NAME clubs only. Non-NOME members should be encouraged and invited to join NAME so they can participate in this event. All efforts should be made to include ALL NAME members in an area. Events could be held locally, statewide, regionally, or online. Clubs might get together with other clubs; smaller groups of individuals in remote areas could meet in someone's home. Whatever the size of the event, the goal should be to welcome and invite all members. Event sponsors are encouraged to work with their State Representatives and Regional Coordinators to connect with members in their area and for support/assistance in planning their event.

2. Local event committees will determine their theme, accessories, length of the event (one day, mini weekend, etc.), and costs.
3. Insurance is available through the NAME office for events sponsored by a NAME Club and held in public locations in both the US and Canada. The form is available online. **Insurance requests must be filed with the NAME office by August 1, 2015.**
4. We encourage participation from NAME shop owners and members. If a shop/shop owner is a NAME member, he/she may sponsor a NAME Day event BUT participation is limited to NAME members only.
5. Fees are to be set locally with all efforts made to keep costs low and reasonable. Because NAME is a nonprofit organization, any profit from your event must be used for educational or charitable purposes. Please also remember that we are a part of a national organization and it would be nice if you could find a way to make a financial donation to NAME. You could add a few dollars onto your registration fee, plan some type of a fundraiser for NAME such as selling tickets for donated "helper" prizes, or donate a portion of your event profit to NAME. This is not a requirement but any donations are always appreciated.

It may be enhanced or the size changed, but the project needs to remain close to the "Window" presented. **SECTION 2: BOARD OF TRUSTEES
SECTION 2.9: RELATIONSHIPS**

Proposed Amendment:

No member of the Board of Trustees shall be related to or employed by another member of the current Board of Trustees. No employee of NAME shall serve as a member of the Board of Trustees.

RATIONALE:

To prevent a conflict of interest as a result of permitting an employee to serve on the Board of Trustees and to clarify the meaning.

The Board of Trustees, The Endowment 2000-NAME Committee and The Endowment 2000-NAME Investment Committee shall follow the non-profit Federal and State regulations of Ohio.






