Member Spotlight!

This is your opportunity to meet Lynette Barker, an awesome potter who not only makes and sells her wares but teaches classes in making miniature pottery on a mini wheel. She will be at the Dallas Show in May and at the NAME Convention in July. Here is a brief overview of one of her classes:

Sculpting on a Mini Wheel 101

Since we cannot use a kiln in the hotels where we teach the miniatures classes, I use air-dry clay for classes. It has similar characteristics to my typical sculpting clay.

With a small lump of clay on the mini-wheel, I center the clay mound. Centering is very important! Then I shape the clay into a column, which is an easy shape to make into many other shapes. It gives a good base for vases, bowls, pots, teapots and pitchers. I have collected many useful tools for sculpting, and my favorites are a wire loop tool and a curved, sharp carving tool. With these, I hollow out the center of the column and begin to expand the sides. This movement is called "bellying", because it reminds one of a pot-bellied stove. A touch of water from a paintbrush will help moisten the clay, if it becomes difficult to manage. At this point, it can become anything! I can draw the sides up to make it a tall vase, or I can expand the sides and make it a fully round rose bowl vase, or even smooth the sides and create a lovely free-form bowl! My imagination is the only limitation! Sometimes the clay has ideas of its own and becomes something totally different than what I had planned! :-) This is called a "Happy Accident"!

Some of my most unique pieces and most popular art forms have been Happy Accidents! My first fancy pitcher was a result of a failed vase! I had a beautiful, flared lip on an elegant, smooth tall vase, and I was just about to take it off the wheel, when one side flopped. It just dropped out of shape! I was so upset; I almost smashed it. But I looked at it again, and it looked a bit like a spout - so I shaped it into a spout! It became my first pitcher! And now I use every vase that doesn't hold an edge, or if I happen to bump a lip with a tool, that part is now transformed into a spout! A bowl that is not even can become a platter (just flatten the whole out until it is your new idea.) Almost anything can become something better. If the top of a vase becomes too thin from over-tooling, take it off, and the result is a lovely bowl! Most anything can be used.

I often tell my students that they are all capable of creating something beautiful. And they do! They just have to try. No student has ever left my class without something that they can be proud of. You all have a special something that makes you unique. And that comes out in your creativity. I am astonished at some of the pieces my students have created in class! Some who have never tried clay before! Most have not sculpted on a mini wheel before. And the treasures they have accomplished are marvelous!

Air-dry clay will dry in about 2 hours, so some have "glazed" their pieces in class. We use nail polish! Yes, just plain, Dollar Store nail polish. It gives them a nice, shiny surface, and seals the clay so it is durable. We had a great time. I'm not too strict about what you make, just that you try. We all have fun and learn some things - yes, I learn, too. I am learning every day. Life is so much more interesting when you are growing. And there is so much to learn! :-)

I sell and teach at all the shows that I go to and when I teach, I bring mini wheels for all the students to use or buy. Most students work in 1:12 scale, and that is how I teach it, as it is easiest to start that "large." But you can easily translate that into 1:24 scale. I have made things as tiny as 1:144 scale on the wheel. :-)

I always have smaller scale items for sale, too. My next classes will be given in Chicago at the Tom Bishop Miniatures Show in April. Then, at Maysville, Kentucky at the Kentucky Gateway Museum Center, also in April. I will be teaching, giving a Theme Luncheon, and selling at the NAME Convention in La Quinta in July! I am so excited - this will be my first NAME Convention! I hope to meet you all there! Please come by and introduce yourselves and sign up for my classes - I love to teach, and you will not go away disappointed. And come and shop my table! I have new, never before seen, pieces at every show. I will also be teaching and selling at the Philly Show for the first time this year in November.

Looking forward to meeting many of you. See you in Chicago, Kentucky, Dallas, California or Philly!

Famous and Valuable Dollhouses

- **Queen Mary's Dolls' House**

: Built between 1921 and 1924, it is perhaps the most famous in the world. It features working elevators, running water, and a library with tiny, original books by authors like Arthur Conan Doyle.

- **Astolat Dollhouse Castle**

: This 800-pound structure is one of the most valuable miniatures ever created, featuring thousands of high-quality items, including real gold and sterling silver fixtures.

- **Petronella Oortman's House**

: A famous 17th-century Dutch cabinet house that cost as much as a real house of its time to furnish.
